One of the biggest challenges in teaching, both online and in the traditional classroom, is assessing student understanding. Part of the challenge lies in the fact that there are different ways of understanding something and finding the most appropriate way to assess that kind of understanding. Another challenge is finding a way for students to demonstrate their understanding in a way that closely resembles what is in their heads. For less complex kinds of knowledge, such as memorizing facts and definitions, assessment is fairly straightforward. But what about more complex or high-order kinds of knowledge, like showing why we have seasons, explaining the conflict between Israel and Palestine, or explaining predictions of global warming?

This session will discuss and show how models and a model way of thinking can help online teachers better assess understanding of complex knowledge and help online students better demonstrate their understanding of complex knowledge.
